



JU 390/590 Internship: Working Across Cultures Syllabus

COURSE DESCRIPTION: Connect what you have learned in the classroom to real-world professional experiences and prepare yourself for the future! The *Working Across Cultures* internship course, offered through CIS Abroad, will guide you to develop critical thinking, problem-solving, collaboration, and cross-cultural communication skills while engaging in professional work experiences abroad - adding global awareness to your professional experience.

Through online facilitated challenges and reflection, you will gain insights into your potential career field, apply in-class learning to real-world projects, and deepen your understanding of what it means to be interculturally fluent - in alignment with your career and personal development goals.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE: CIS Abroad students enrolled in the *International Internship* course, either for credit or not for credit.

INSTRUCTION METHOD: Hybrid (combines a minimum of 90 hrs of on the job work with asynchronistic online instruction)

TIME TO COMPLETION: Minimum of 8 weeks unless a custom program





EXPECTED LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Students will develop and demonstrate NACE Core Competencies* as follows:

- Global Equity & Inclusion: Interns will demonstrate the awareness, attitude, knowledge, and skills required to equitably engage and include people from different local and global cultures. Engage in anti-racist practices that actively challenge the systems, structures, and policies of racism by demonstrating openness, inclusiveness, and ability to interact respectfully with diverse groups.
- Cross-Cultural Communication: Interns will Articulate thoughts and ideas clearly and effectively verbally and in writing taking into account cultural differences.
- Career & Self Development: Interns will proactively develop oneself and one's career through continual personal and professional learning, awareness of one's strengths and weaknesses, navigation of career opportunities, and networking to build relationships within and without one's organization. Interns will also develop plans and goals for one's future career.
- Professionalism: Knowing work environments differ greatly, interns will understand and demonstrate effective work habits, and act in the interest of the larger community and workplace.

DOCUMENTING ACHIEVEMENT: The specific requirements that must be met in order to earn this microcredential include:

- 1. Successfully completing each module of the Working Across Cultures online curriculum during the allotted time, including recording and saving your reflection documents as instructed and actively engaging with and posting responses to the Challenges. **50**%
- 2. Completing all of your internship work hours and receiving a positive final evaluation from your internship supervisor. **25**%
- 4. Submitting your 30 second elevator pitch. 10%
- 5. Submitting a video, blog, or similar creative deliverable which presents the outcomes/results of your internship experience. **10**%
- 6. Submitting a quality final LinkedIn profile with a final post about the skills you developed during your internship you can use your post or blog from #5. **5**%

Upon completion, students who have elected to receive academic credit for the internship will be awarded an official Jacksonville University transcript. In addition, students will receive the Working Across Cultures Micro-Credential certification along with the Working Across Cultures Micro-Credential Badge to post on social media. Students will also be equipped to clearly and concisely explain their certification in any situation, highlighting skills acquired, be it a conversation, or interview for graduate school or employment.
